I am a current resident of the Los Angeles area in California. I am hoping to relocate to San Antonio within the next five years. There are many things that I find positive in the city of San Antonio. I love that housing prices as well as the prices of gas and food are much lower than they are here in Southern California. I am also impressed with the crime rate and the political and religious organizations present in the city. I do, however, find the city to be lacking on two fronts.

First, while there are many things to do in San Antonio, the city cannot compete with the wide variety of options available in Southern California. I love to visit the River Walk, the historic Alamo, Sea World, and Six Flags Fiesta Texas, but I find that the lack of such places as Disneyland and Universal Studios is disappointing. I'm also saddened by the lack of proximity to outdoor activities such as the beach and mountain resorts. Upon contemplation, I know that the city can do nothing about the lack of natural wonders, but do suggest that Disney be contacted about the possibility of building a theme park in or near the city of San Antonio. There is quite a bit of open and uninhabited land north of the city perfect for Disney to build another Magic Kingdom as well as a second movie studio theme park. This would kill two birds with one stone – I'd not lose access to Disneyland, and I'd have access to a theme park similar to Universal Studios.

I look forward to cheering on the San Antonio Spurs as they compete for the playoffs and eating dinner at one of the fabulous restaurants on the River Walk.
